Up the Suisun Slough

The group met at the Benecia Marina for the day long cruise up the Suisun Slough to Suisun City for lunch.

Going through the Suisun Bay we saw the active tanker traffic going to Pittsburg and Stockton. Once on the slough we went through beautiful marshes and farmland. Many different birds greeted us, and the really big birds of nearby Travis Air Base were flying overhead.

Suisun City was established in the 1850s. Its location made it ideal for commerce and transportation during the California Gold Rush. In 1868—1869, the First Transcontinental Railroad connected to downtown Suisun City via the California Pacific Railroad, expanding the region's reach across the United States. In the 1960s and 1970s, Suisun City experienced rapid growth as the San Francisco Bay Area's suburban ring expanded to the formerly rural Solano County. Extensive redevelopment in the

historic downtown in the last 30 years has evolved into a wonderful waterfront and promenade park.

We walked around town, briefly contemplating eating at Bud's burgers, but finally settled on a lovely place in a historic building, and had a great lunch at the Main Street Grill.

Later we sat in the park for a while waiting for the tide to turn and then we sailed home. Nobody in the group had been to this area, and it was really fun and interesting.

he McCoy Chapter of the YMCA Alumni Association held a board meeting on August 15th at the Peninsula YMCA in San Mateo. Bud Doane chaired the meeting until Fred Stickney arrived, having being caught in a bad traffic situation. Also present were Bob Smeenk, Jan Dale, Pam Von Wiegand, Pam Sheble, Chris Logan, Ron Markillie, and Roberta Duncan

Guests were Sally Stickney, and also Patick Kelle and Dara Meinerth from the Y Professional Network.

There was a discussion that there is significantly less membership income than in the same period last year. Since dues processing is done by National; notices go out and remittances go back to National. There is no local contact, and we are not kept current as to who has remitted. Most member contact is made through our newsletter. Our membership income has definitely dropped since the collection and billing was taken over by National. Fred Stickney, Bud Doane and Jan Dale will meet to discuss dues billing and tracking with suggestions on how to improve this process.

A motion was made and passed to increase the McCoy Chapter portion of the membership dues by \$10 so that \$25 comes back to the Chapter. This is more reflective of most chapters membership fees. Our fees support the printing and distribution of the newsletter four times a year, the travel costs of our President to YMCA Alumni Meetings, and subsidizing any chapter events that don't break even. Fred Stickney reported the resignations of Greg O'Brien, President, and Lloyd Licher as a member at large. Greg O'Brien has resigned as President due to the illness of his wife Chris. Fred Stickney recognized Greg for his leadership and contributions to the Mc-Coy Chapter and wished Greg's wife Chris the best possible recovery.

The Y Professional Network (formerly AYP) was represented by Patrick Kelley and Dara Meinerth who updated us on their mission and plans, and to request our collaboration with YPN, especially in the process of nominating and awarding the McCoy Chapter Leadership Award. Nominations for the McCoy Leadership Award are made by local Y's to be submitted by Sept 6. Bud Doane, Pam Von Wiegand, Fred Stickney and Sally Stickney will review nominations. Nomination criteria will be provided by Patrick Kelle. It is hoped that collaboration between YPN and the McCoy Chapter will mutually support each organization's goals of increasing membership and retention.

The YPN has gone through a major reorganization in order to represent a broader group of Y personnel. The upcoming Conference will be Oct 17 and 18 in Walnut Creek. Dara Meinerth outlined the topics that will be discussed relating to

the theme of this year's conference, which is Self Care. Representatives from the McCoy chapter will participate on a panel about the value of contributing to the Y retirement fund while working, and the value received after retirement. It was noted that the Y retirement fund is fully funded and therefore very secure. It was suggested Pam Von Wiegand be part of this panel.

Program Reports centered on the Ashland Shakespeare event which drew 31 participants. This event is co- hosted by the Allen-Stone and Mc Coy Chapters. Attendees reported it was a fun event and created a real sense of community. Next year's event, to be held in April, is in the planning stages.

It was proposed, using the Ashland event as a model, that the McCoy Chapter plan Board meetings within the context of a recreational activity. Fall Event: A Google Headquarters tour was proposed. Chris Logan will investigate. Bud Doane will investigate a new venue for our annual Holiday Party and we will have information by the next newsletter.

New Membership Chair, Bob Smeenk, reported membership retention across the country is mediocre. Membership strategies were discussed, such as having luncheons to introduce ourselves to potential retirees in bigger Y's, and tagging onto scheduled retirement talks at various Y's across our entire service areas, including both large and small Y's. CEO's have generally been receptive to these ideas.

Ron Markillie gave the EAF Report. Donations have been dropping over the past years. There is also a problem tracking donations based on how they are recorded by National. In order to ascertain if they are being correctly credited to the McCoy Chapter, Ron will follow up on this.

Y National Travel Program. Fred Stickney reported alumni associations nationally are sent brochures offering Y sponsored travel trips. It was reported that these trips are well planned, and well- priced, making them a great travel option. Pam Von Wiegand will be our Chapter travel representative. Bea Halk Recognition



ea Halk was recently inducted to the National YMCA Hall of Fame, held during the YMCA General Assembly July 20th in Anaheim Bea Betterton-Halk pioneered modern-day CA. human resources in the Y Movement. She was a vocal advocate for creating strong networks of human resource leaders across the country. Specifically, she paved the way for all Ys from operating with essentially a clerical human resources position to a more strategic approach that featured best practices to meet organizational objectives. She was the driving force behind the formation of the largest human resource nationwide network: The North American Urban Group Human Resource Officers. She was known for her many selfless acts, including investing her own resources to introduce others to training opportunities and scholarships. Bea immigrated from Mexico when she was eight and endured many personal hardships, including the passing of her parents while still a teen, all which strengthened her resolve to be a leader and advocate for multicultural awareness in the Y Movement. Additionally, she attained an M.S. in Human Service Administration & Organizational Development from Springfield College while working 2 jobs and raising 5 kids, and was a presenter at graduation. Upon her retirement in 2002, the North American Urban Group Human Resource Officers instituted a perpetual award entitled the "Bea Betterton-Halk Human Resources Career Excellence Award", which honors retiring H.R. officers who meet the criteria.

Bio & Book Info: **Daniel Russell** is Google's Senior User Experience Researcher in the area of Search Quality and User Happiness. He earned his PhD in computer science, specializing in Artificial Intelligence. These days he realizes that amplifying human intelligence is his real passion. His day job is understanding how people search for information, and the ways they come to learn about the world through Google. Dan's current research is to understand how human intelligence and artificial intelligence can work together to be better than either as a solo intelligence. His 20% job is teaching the world to search more effectively. His MOOC, PowerSearchingWithGoogle.com, is currently hosting 3,000 learners / week in the course. In the past 3 years, 4.5 million students have attended his online search classes, augmenting their intelligence with AI (which means that his talking head has been on a computer screen for more than 250 years).
