



Some Thoughts On Personal Charitable Support

How charitable do you want to be? How charitable can you afford to be? Both questions are quite personal considerations. Many of us wrestle with seeking a solution to these questions.

I was quite involved in urging colleagues to learn and use good fundraising techniques In my professional life. Now that I am retired it is much more likely that Nancy and I will be asked to financially support a project than that for which I will be doing the fundraising.

If you are active in a church or synagogue that might represent your largest financial contribution. Perhaps you recognize the United Way as an effective way of providing for your town's social service organizations. These two might attract your largest financial commitments.

I have further suggestions for those of us with a commitment to the YMCA. First would be the YMCA from which you have retired. That YMCA might have a significant draw on your charitable dollars. I cannot support eleven branches, but I do support the branch where I live, the camp branches (OK, I admit a bias towards resident camping) and the urban branch which has little chance of balancing its budget on fees.

Then there is our **YMCA Alumni** organization and our homebuilding project in the **Dominican Republic**. If you have been there you know this project just feels right. Rarely do you have an opportunity to participate personally in making a positive change in the way a family lives. This is one of those rare opportunities.

Similarly, there is **YMCA World Service**. It is a national arm of the American YMCA which reaches out successfully around the world to help YMCAs in Third World countries produce larger and stronger programs.

Finally, there is the **YMCA Emergency Assistance Fund.** This is an idea funded by us for us. It provides needed financial support to YMCA people, you and me, who have suffered a financial emergency due to a storm, a fire, a death or other disaster. Some years ago I became aware of a woman whose YMCA professional husband died much too early. She had medical bills beyond what their insurance would pay. The Emergency Assistance Fund rescued her and their three children.

It really is a good idea and a useful activity to decide what you can afford to contribute. Then plan in advance which projects you will support and how much you will spend. Once you have a plan you still will have to decide how to handle the especially worthy project which comes along mid-year.

### Secours Speciaux: An Update



YMCA Alumni made a recent contribution of \$200,000 to Secours Speciaux (the EAF of the World YMCA) from our World Brotherhood Fund to help support our retired colleagues around the world during this COVID-19 pandemic. It was reported in The CONNECTION. A recent report from

Secours follows. You can be proud of your organization.

"The **Secours Speciaux** fund committee met twice in May via **ZOOM.** We focused on responding to the **COVID-19** impact on retirees. Responding to the pandemic, **Secours Speciaux** has sent grants of \$500 each to 35 retirees around the world with little or no pension. Each retiree signed a receipt for the funds and many included heartfelt thank you letters.

"Another group of retirees in need has been cleared through our checking process and has been approved for a grant. They too will receive \$500. We have not yet had any requests for assistance from persons without health insurance who have been hospitalized by the virus, but we are ready to respond quickly to any requests for help. Very recently we learned of two virus-related deaths: a Peruvian retiree and a U.S. (New York City) staff member. We are discussing how to help the staff who have been furloughed or laid off because their YMCA has closed." -- Bonnie Mairs, Chair


**Corps**, led by **Bill Hooson** of the **Weatherford Chapter** and a member of the ISC Task Force.

This impactful work has been recognized by the **YMCA Alumni** national leadership and as such, the president appointed Lou Falk to chair a new initiative to undertake a study for assessing whether there is a need and/or interest in undertaking a national service project in the United States.

The new **National Service Project Task Force** is made up of representatives from each of the 17 YMCA Alumni Chapters from around the country with Lou providing the leadership. Lou has asked me to represent our own New England Chapter.

Listed below are the attributes that were identified as part of our first national **ZOOM** task force meeting for you to review.

### "How do we identify a project?

First, what are the attributes we should be looking for?

**Challenging**...the project can't be easy. Rotary's Polio Plus wasn't an easy project. It has to say to our younger retirees and those about to

retire that there is more to life in retirement than picking up trash on beaches, even though that is important also! Rather...if you are a member of YMCA Alumni here is an opportunity to continue your life-changing work.

**Do-able** We're not Rotary International, and we can't possibly eliminate polio world-wide, so what can we do? Whatever we choose we must believe that, even though it will be a stretch, we can achieve success.

**Sustainable** We need to build a reputation for YMCA Alumni on this project. It needs to become a project that future retirees look forward to becoming a part of when they retire so they will join our organization. Therefore it needs to be a multi-year project...."

**Lou** has asked each chapter representative to solicit input from their respective chapter members. So here is where you as a proud member of the **New England YMCA Alumni Chapter** come in and where I need your help.

- Please review the above listed attributes and let me know if we are missing anything or if you have additional input on the ones that are listed.
- 1. Please think of national service projects that you feel we should consider undertaking based on the above listed attributes. It could be to address the critical needs of the Sioux Indian YMCA, supporting YMCA resident camps, addressing the underserved communities of the inner city, etc... Don't limit your thinking. We are looking for a pool of ideas to evaluate and we will then report back with our top choices so send in all of your thoughts, regardless of how traditional or extreme they might be. Let the committee determine and assess the ultimate validity and soundness of the idea as a potential project to undertake.

Thanks very much for your time in reading this and for sending along your thoughts. Just because we are retired doesn't mean that we can't still have a significant impact on the lives of those who are under resourced and under served. The strength, impact and longevity of the YMCA Movement since 1844 is due to the commitment of volunteers to make a difference.
